

"Etch and Catch"






Newest Burbank Police Officers

Burbank Mental Health Evaluation Team

The Burbank Police Department's Mental Health Evaluation Team marks ten years of service to the citizens of Burbank.

In May of 2012, the Burbank Police Department and the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health joined together in a cooperative effort to provide the City of Burbank with a mental health team aimed towards addressing the growing needs of those suffering from mental illness and homelessness. This joint partnership, known as the Burbank Mental Health Evaluation Team (BMHET), employs a co-response model. The team is comprised of a police officer, Officer Ennisha Kyles, a licensed Department of Health clinician, Sonia Casanova, and an Administrative Analyst, Kelly Bravo-Cuevas.

BMHET's responsibilities are threefold: provide crisis support during calls for service, provide on-going case management support to other divisions regarding persons who would benefit from intensive case management/linkage, and the team provides training to city departments and other community groups.

When BMHET responds to calls for service or contacts an individual with mental health underpinnings, the team evaluates the person and determines if further mental health treatment is required. If so, the team utilizes the numerous resources available through the Los Angeles County Department of Health.

Baker 2 Vegas BPD Relay Team Secures 7th Place

April 9, 2022 marked the start of this year's Baker 2 Vegas Challenge Cup Relay Race. Once again, the Burbank Police Department competed against teams composed of other law enforcement officers from all over Southern California. The annual 19-stage, 120-mile relay race started near the town of Baker, California and ended in the City of Las Vegas, Nevada.

The Baker 2 Vegas race is known for its steep climbs, hot temperatures, and sometimes treacherous conditions as participants run day and night to reach the finish line.

This year, Team Burbank completed the race in 18 hours and 22 minutes, finishing in seventh place out of eleven teams in their category. This finish was enough to earn the coveted Baker 2 Vegas "Mug," with an overall placing of 99 out of 250+ teams.

The Burbank Police Baker 2 Vegas Team would like to thank everyone who supported this year's race effort, including the Burbank Police Command Staff, Burbank Police Officers' Association, support staff and volunteers, those who picked up extra shifts to allow officers to participate, and community members who donated to support the team's participation.

The Matthew Pavelka Scholarship Awards Program was established by the Burbank Police Foundation in honor of Burbank Police Officer Matthew Pavelka, who was killed in the line of duty on November 15, 2003. Scholarships are awarded to high school seniors who have demonstrated outstanding efforts in pursuit of an educational or vocational goal. The purpose of the program is to motivate students to dedicate themselves more thoroughly and responsibly to their education and training, and to encourage them to strive for excellence and distinction in whatever field they choose. BICYCLE SAFETY MONTH

- Share the Road -

May is Bicycle Safety Month and the Burbank Police Department is encouraging those out riding and driving to look out for one another and help reduce injuries on our roads.

Bicycle Safety remains a key concern and top priority in our community year-round. It is the goal of the Burbank Police Department to reduce the number of collisions, injuries and deaths involving bicyclists by providing education and increasing enforcement to help safeguard everyone on the road.

The Burbank Police Department aims to remind bicycle riders to follow the same rules of the road as drivers, including stopping at stop signs, yielding to pedestrians, and not riding distracted or under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Drivers should remain vigilant in looking out for bicyclists, and remember, California law requires drivers to allow at least three feet of space when passing a bicycle on the road.

To help keep bicyclists safe on our roadways, the Burbank Police Department has the following reminders:

- Bike riders should always wear a helmet.
- When cycling, use hand signals for turning and stopping.
- Drivers should look behind them before making a turn at an intersection, changing lanes, pulling away from a curb, opening their door, or when reversing or leaving a parking space.
- Bicyclists should always ride in the same direction as traffic.
- Bicyclists should make themselves visible by wearing brightly colored clothing, and reflective clothing in low light conditions.
- Bicyclists are reminded to use lights from dusk to dawn (white light to the front; red flashing light or reflectors to the rear).
- Both drivers and bicyclists should avoid distractions like using their cell phone.


MHET in a Decade

Burbank Mental Health Evaluation Team (MHET) is Celebrating its 10th Year of Service!






MHET is a co-response model that partners a police officer with a licensed mental health professional. MHET's mission is to divert individuals experiencing mental illness from the criminal justice system, reduce the likelihood of future law enforcement contacts and emergency hospitalizations, and provide linkage to resources to support sustained care.

Over the past decade, MHET has evolved and implemented a robust service delivery model specific to the needs of our community. MHET focuses on five primary areas of service:




- Targeted Case Management
- · Homeless Outreach
- Consultation
- Community Engagement/Training

In 2018, MHET implemented a case management system that has captured approximately 4,000 team community contacts. Beginning from 2018 to present, MHET conducted the following contacts:



- Received over 650 referrals from members of the community and police department personnel
- Conducted over 1,800 case management follow-ups and consultations with individuals, family members, and care providers
- · Conducted over 1,100 outreach contacts with unhoused individuals



- Expansion of the program to include a second MHET Team and extended coverage for more days and hours in the week
- New vehicle with a specially designed transportation compartment
- Mental Health Awareness Program (MHAP) Decal
- Muffins with MHET Community Event (Tuesday 5/17/22 @ Miracle Bakery 8:00 a.m.—10:00 a.m.)
