'Operation Clear Track' Focuses on Railroad Safety

September 23 through September 29 is designated as Rail Safety Week across the United States. The goal of Rail Safety Week is to raise awareness of the need for rail safety education, and to remind the general public to keep themselves safe near highway-rail grade crossings and railroad rights-of-way.

Rail lines within the City are active 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The heavy daily load of vehicular traffic traversing grade crossings is potentially hazardous, and a cause of concern for safe railroad operations. With literally thousands of cars and commercial trucks crossing our rail lines each day, grade crossing violations occur. Motorists who stop on the tracks or evade gate-crossing warnings may be the cause of a train verses vehicle collision that will almost always result in serious injury or death. In addition, these collisions can delay train and vehicle traffic for hours.



On September 25, Burbank Police Department Traffic personnel conducted a highway-grade crossing enforcement operation within the City of Burbank at Buena Vista Street and Vanowen Street, as well as Clybourn Avenue and Empire Avenue. These railroad crossings were monitored for violations. However, no railroad crossing violations were observed. This was a very promising outcome to an important safety campaign.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

Halloween is a time to celebrate and enjoy the annual traditions of dressing up in costumes and trick-or-treating for those savory sweets. It is a time for fun with friends, family, and neighbors. The Burbank Police wish you a safe and Happy Halloween on October 31.

In an effort to help the Burbank community enjoy Halloween safely, the Burbank Police Department is sharing the following tips for motorists, parents, and trick-or-treaters:

<u>Motorists</u>

• Please slow down, especially in residential neighborhoods, and obey all traffic signs and signals. We ask that you drive below the speed limit and be alert for children walking and crossing the street.

• Dark costumes can be hard to see, especially at night. Please be on the lookout for trick-ortreating enthusiasts and remember they may not always see you.

<u>Parents</u>

- Make sure small children are supervised at all times by an adult, and that children under the age of 14 are accompanied by a responsible guardian.
- Plan and discuss the route your trick-or-treaters will follow and make sure they stick to it.
- Encourage children to remain in groups, if possible.
- Teach children to stop only at well-lit houses and to never enter a stranger's home.
- Establish a time for children to return home.
- Tell children not to eat any treats until they get home.
- Inspect treats and get rid of any that look as though they've been opened or tampered with.

<u> Trick-or-Treaters</u>

- Be visible! Wear reflective tape on costumes to improve visibility to motorists and others.
- Wear disguises that don't obstruct vision and avoid face masks. Instead, consider using nontoxic face paint.
- Ensure any props are flexible and blunt-tipped to avoid injury from tripping or horseplay.

• Carry a flashlight and place it face down in the treat bucket to free up one hand. Never shine it into the eyes of oncoming drivers. When crossing the street, hold the flashlight and point it towards the ground to illuminate your surrounding area and alert drivers to your presence.

• Have your parent or guardian inspect all treats and never consume any candy that appears to have been opened or tampered with.
