Throughout her time as a Police Explorer, Diana used the skills and discipline she learned to help her become an active member of many different community organizations and activities. Diana served as President of her school's Associated Student Body,



Team Captain of the varsity volleyball team, was a competitor in speech tournaments, an intern for Congressman Adam Schiff, and a competitor in the Los Angeles County and California State Science Fairs. She also promoted to the rank of Explorer Sergeant of the Burbank Explorer Post.

Recently, several members of the Los Angeles County Police Chiefs' Association (LACPCA) gathered in front of the famed Hollywood sign to show their support in the effort to raise public awareness about the importance of early detection and treatment of breast cancer. Burbank Police Chief Scott LaChasse was one of many police chiefs in attendance who wore Burbank Police Department pink patches as part of the "Pink Patch Project," a nationwide campaign supporting breast cancer awareness.

Breast Cancer Awareness Month officially kicks-off in October. It is estimated that approximately one in every eight women will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime. This disease can have a profound impact on the patient and her loved ones. However, upon early detection, breast cancer can be effectively treated with surgery, radiation therapy, hormone therapy and chemotherapy. This year, the Burbank Police Department has unveiled their own pink patch to help raise money and awareness.

## Back to School Traffic Safety

With the new school year upon us, the Burbank Police Department would like to remind the community that traffic safety around our schools is everyone's responsibility. By following a few simple rules and tips, parents and students can assist the Burbank Police in creating a safe environment for everyone near our schools.

## The Do's & Don'ts

#### DO:

- Be patient, especially in heavy traffic. Slow down, plan ahead, and arrive early.
- Use the safe delivery/valet drop-off areas when and where available.
- Always remember to pull to the curb when dropping children off at school.
- Have your children exit your vehicle on the right (sidewalk side), away from traffic.
- Stay alert and refrain from using cell phones or anything else that might distract you.
- Park your vehicle in the appropriate areas, obeying all posted parking restrictions.
- Obey all traffic laws.

#### DON'T:

- Park or leave your vehicle unattended in the delivery/valet drop-off area.
- Block driveways or stop/park in red zones.
- Stop your vehicle in the middle of the street to let your child in or out of your vehicle.
- Walk between vehicles in the drop-off areas.
- Allow your child to cross the street outside of designated crossing zones.
- Pass vehicles on the wrong side of the road.

#### **Additional Tips:**

- Consider parking your vehicle away from congested areas and walk your child to school.
- Always cross the street at the corners and use crossing guards for assistance.
